

# Introduction

The citizen's expectations on emergency services are high when it comes to saving lives and property. In order to meet these expectations, the Cypress County Fire Department has systems in place to carry out their objectives including adequate equipment, strategically located fire stations and memorandum of agreements.

Cypress County has identified twelve firefighting service areas (also referenced as fire zone areas, fire protection areas and fire service areas) within the County to provide fire services to its citizens and visitors to the County. Eight of the firefighting service areas are being serviced by the Cypress County Fire Department; Box Springs, Elkwater, Hilda, Irvine, One Four, Schuler, Seven Persons, and Walsh. The other four firefighting service areas are serviced by Jenner, Suffield, Bow Island, or Medicine Hat. The Memorandum of Agreement with the City of Medicine Hat is the only agreement that has a retainer fee for service. The other three agreements are on a cost recovery basis with an identified fee schedule (fee for service).

# Background

TSI was presented with a number of statistics that are used in this report. In some cases, an average was taken from previous years in order to achieve a value for the future (i.e. call statistics for 2017 and 2018 are not available). No fire services can predict the amount and the type of calls that will be attended in a calendar year and relies on this historical data.

The Cypress County 2017 fire department operational budget is \$1,565,461.00. \$364,389.76 of the budget is for the fee for the City of Medicine Hat Fire Services to provide fire services to Cypress County. The City of Medicine Hat agreement with Cypress County covers the small urban areas of Desert Blume, Dunmore, and Veinerville and surrounding area. This is referred to as the Medicine Hat firefighting service area of Cypress County.

The current funding formula for the Cypress County agreement with the City of Medicine Hat is as follows:

- City of Medicine Hat Fire Services budget Operating NET (excluding Cypress County agreement fee)
- LESS
- Lease costs for Ladder 1 and Ladder 3
- > 95% of contracted services and materials/supplies for apparatus and equipment
- Fire Prevention Branch net costs
- Operations overtime Costs

The cost from this calculation is divided by the combined population figures for Medicine Hat (60,426) and the Cypress County "Medicine Hat firefighting service area" (1500) to develop a per capita cost.




A 10% overhead fee is added to the per capita dollar amount. The new per capita dollar amount is multiplied by the Cypress County population figure (1500).

There is no documentation to indicate how this formula was developed or what the 1500 population of the firefighting service area represents. Assumptions can be made that the number either represented:

- 1. the populations of the small urban areas and not taking into consideration the whole firefighting service area population or
- 2. the total of residences rather than residents.

The City of Medicine Hat has indicated that a new agreement renewal will include updated population of their firefighting service area for Cypress County of 3513 as provided by Cypress County GIS Mapping in 2016 and the Statistics Canada 2016 census for the City of Medicine Hat.

Comments from interviews were gathered for this project from one on one interviews conducted with Cypress County staff as identified above and an interview with the City of Medicine Hat Fire Chief and Deputy Chief. Other comments from Cypress County were captured during the interviews for the Fire Master Plan project.

### **Interview Notes**

### Cypress County

- A retainer for service
- Can be charged for every time the City of Medicine comes out to the fire service area
- Contract very one sided and expensive for what Cypress County gets
- County should not expect Medicine Hat to attend calls
- County provides the City with 2 fully-equipped engines
- Free use of equipment in city if required
- All maintenance and servicing costs of County equipment borne by County
- All equipment has been updated to meet Medicine Hat expectations
- Very seldom are County trucks sent to MVCs in the service area
- Absolute discretion to attend any calls in the County and be invoiced
- When backfilling the fire hall, the City can invoice the County
- Outside the fire service area, the County gets invoiced
- Relationship mostly good
- On scene relationship not working very smoothly
- Have Cypress County's radios but choose to use their own
- Most efficient is to have the City of Medicine Hat respond
- Gradually reduce Medicine Hat's area to see how it will work
- Analyzing the numbers to determine cost
- Dunmore and Dessert Blume would not be satisfied with a change in service
- Expand the service areas of existing stations and add one in Dunmore with a training facility, can buy or lease a building
- Look at the fees charged and remove the equipment capital
- Use County's repeater system for communication (911, and county personnel)
- Report on all calls that the City of Medicine Hat attends in Cypress County



- Incident Command clarified in agreement
- Seven Persons can respond to Dessert Blume
- Add a Cypress County Fire Station in Dunmore
- Adjust County fire service area boundaries
- A change in service provider would be a concern for Dessert Blume, Dunmore and MVCs
- Citizens won't be concerned with who the provider is, just as long as someone shows up
- Will need to educate the residence
- The agreement outlines the fee schedule
- Cypress County provides the capital equipment trucks, SCBA, etc.
- Currently, the agreement states that they will deliver fire services to the identified areas as their operational commitments allow
- Ability to attend other calls outside of their identified jurisdictions
- Have received invoices for back filling staffing levels due to a call in the County
- Would like to see County deliver services to their people from their own department
- More advance notice for equipment/capital purchases or changes
- Back-up mutual aid for rest of County
- Operationally, while on scene, information he receives would indicate that MHFD feels the need to be in charge
- The most "efficient" would be services being delivered by MHFD but is not the most "cost effective" model

### City of Medicine Hat

- Service provider of fire services to Cypress County Dunmore/Desert Blume areas
- Provide same level of service to Cypress County as we do here response time excepted
- Respond on occasion outside of the identified fire zones in agreement
- No mutual aid agreement in place just one agreement
- County supplies 2 pieces of equipment for our use as required
- Sometimes we respond with our own when we are away from the station on pre-fire planning or fire inspection activities
- Manpower charges are invoiced for responses outside of the identified areas
- Current agreement is more of a retainer for services that ensure that there are people and equipment available to provide a service
- When operations permit, we always send adequate resources to get the job done
- MVC response is typically MH equipment
- Agree to provide response to Cypress County if at all possible
- MHFD is not under obligation to respond
- Have been occasions in the past where MHFD was totally committed, but have never had to decline a response to date
- Communication between agencies is relatively good
- Operationally, things are good experience and familiarity with respects to IC roles.
- Spoke to issues being raised about the use of communication equipment sometimes it is used out of familiarity.
- Prior to 2006 it was a small retainer and a fee/incident



- Retainer fee brought in to reflect principle of shared equality
- Based on the cost of all the parts of the MHFD that Cypress County would access/utilize
- Does not include the following:
  - **OT**
  - No Fire Prevention/Inspection staff
  - No costs associated to Aerial apparatus
- Current retainer essentially pays for the capacity of the fire department to be there
- Fee Formula
  - 95% of contracted
  - o 10% admin fee
  - Census numbers was using 1500 in previous agreement new info 3513
- Concerned about shrinking down the response areas
- MHFD wants to stay engaged
- Current FDM software for data management and reporting not compatible with Cypress County software
- Provides statistical reports upon request in the past
- Has been some friction on scene occasionally attributes this more to personal conflicts than anything
- Has received complaints about response times usually 3-5 times a year Cypress County does not have any identified response times in the agreement
- States there is a massive expectation from Desert Blume with respects to response and service delivery
- Equates District Chief of Cypress County to a Captain of MHFD
- MHFD is open to other opportunities

### Cypress County pays 40% of the admin costs of the City of Medicine Hat budget

TSI believes that there are minimal administrative costs associated with the management of The City of Medicine Hat Fire Agreement. The per capita cost has an overhead fee of 10% that could cove additional administration of the agreement.

#### Cypress County pays 50% of training and education budget

TSI recognizes that the City of Medicine Hat has to supply trained personnel to respond as part of their commitment to Cypress County. Training and education for the fire service is costly to acquire and maintain. To ensure that safe and efficient service delivery is provided, there is a cost to ensuring that Cypress County receives a level of service that is not open or subject to non-compliance with Alberta Occupational Health and Safety.

#### Cypress County pays 50% of operations budget

TSI recognizes that the City of Medicine Hat has a financial obligation to meet the operational response of both the City of Medicine Hat and identified Cypress County firefighting service area. The largest part of any operations budget is staffing. Without staffing and all the other operational necessities such as quarters, PPE and equipment, there could not be an effective response by the City of Medicine Hat into the identified firefighting service area.

#### Cypress County Pays 66.6% of apparatus excluding detailed items

Currently, operational response out of the City of Medicine Hat into the Cypress County firefighting service area primarily comes out of two City of Medicine Hat fire stations. While this equates to roughly 66% of the budget, TSI felt that the County needs to be given some credit for equipment and maintenance that they provide as part of their obligations through the Agreement.

#### **Medicine Hat Fire Services Revenue**

Over a 3 year period (2014/15/16) Medicine Hat Fire Services has invoiced Alberta Transportation a total of \$ 14,577.00:

# Remainder of 2017 Fire Service Agreement


All discussions with the City of Medicine Hat were with Fire Chief Stauth and Deputy Fire Chief Webster. Their comments were favorable that budget adjustments would be a reasonable approach to arriving at a fair and equitable fee for both Cypress County and the City of Medicine Hat. All information discussed and presented in this report would need to be vetted and approved by the City of Medicine Hat committees and Council. The remainder of service for 2017, would include the new formula minus the amount already invoiced.

New funding formula for 2017 is \$416,220.24 minus already invoiced \$169,157.50

If service is to continue after June 30th, 2017 a letter of extension would need to be submitted to the City of Medicine Hat for approval. The extension period would be from July 1, 2017 to December 30, 2017 for a fee of **\$247,062.74**
